Introduction

Birmingham City Council (the Council), as the Local Authority for Birmingham is consulting on proposed changes to Selly Oak Trust School (the School). This document describes what is being proposed and why.

What changes are proposed?

The Council is proposing to carry out the following change to the School:

• Permanently increase the number of places the School can offer to pupils, from 376 to 420 from 1st January 2027.

Why do we want to do this? Background:

The School can currently offer up to 376 pupil places. The School currently offers support to pupils with Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD), Moderate Learning Difficulties (MLD), Social, Emotional, and Mental Health (SEMH), Speech, Language (SLCN), and Communication Needs, (SLD) Severe Learning Difficulties.

Evidence of Demand:

There is significant need for more school places in Birmingham for children with EHCPs, both in special schools and Resource Bases in mainstream schools. There has been an increase in the number of school-age pupils with EHCPs in Birmingham, by over 900 in the last three years. There is also an increase in requests for statutory assessment which could result in EHCPs; these requests are currently averaging 150 each month.

When will these changes happen?

Following this consultation period, if the proposal is approved by the decision maker, the changes will be implemented from 1st January 2027.











Will there be any effect on other schools, academies and educational institutions within the area?

There should be no negative effects on other special or mainstream schools within the area. There is currently a shortage of SEND places and no indication that other schools offering SEND provision will be negatively affected. Any impact on other schools should be positive as this proposal creates places for pupils with a range of needs and so releases places at other schools to meet the needs of other pupils.

How will the proposal increase educational standards and parental choice?

The Council is keen to ensure that future places are provided in the areas that they are needed, helping children to attend a school nearer to home and as part of their local community.

How will this affect pupils at the school?

There will be very little impact on the current pupils with the increase of pupil numbers. The pupils will also have access to improved facilities as part of the expansion, as the current modular classrooms that will be replaced were no longer fit for purpose.

How will this affect staff?

Generally, staff will be unaffected and may experience more opportunities for professional development. If this proposal is approved, any impact on terms and conditions would be with full consultation with Trade Unions / Professional Associations.

Travel and Transport:

The impact on transport and travel will be minimal. The school will continue to update their travel plan, as and when required. The Local Authority transport arrangements for children with special needs will apply (Children and Young People's Travel Service).

Will there be changes to the school building?

In order to accommodate the increased number of 41 pupils. The works comprise of the demolition and removal of existing modular teaching and changing room blocks that are no longer fit for purpose and the construction of a new 3 storey standalone building.

What are the project costs for this proposal and how is it funded?

The cost of creating the additional places is not to exceed figure of £13,088,131. It will be funded by High Needs Allocation (HNG), Basic Need (BN) and S106 Selly Oak Bloor Homes.

The ongoing maintenance and running costs of these reconfigured spaces will be the responsibility of the school.











Will this definitely happen?

There is a statutory process we must follow to make these sorts of changes to schools. Following this statutory consultation, the proposal will be presented to the Council's Cabinet Member for Children, Young People and Families; they are the decision maker for this type of proposal.

It is only after a decision that we will be able to say with certainty whether or not the proposal will be implemented. The decision will be published on the consultation website below (BeHeard) and stakeholders will be notified.

What will happen if this proposal is rejected?

If the proposed increase is not approved for implementation, the school will continue to operate at 376 places. This will mean a higher number of pupils will be unable to remain at, or be offered places at, the School in the future. Alternative and additional places would need to be provided at other schools, which could have a negative impact on pupils out of school and on travel arrangements to other provisions.

How do I comment on this proposal?
