Whether you have to pay to drive in the Clean Air Zone depends on the type of fuel and the standard of engine your vehicle has. Engine standards are described as 'Euro' followed by a number – the higher the number, the newer and cleaner the engine.

You will not have to pay to drive in the Clean Air Zone if your vehicle has:

- A diesel engine of Euro 6 (VI) standard or better (most new registrations after 1 September 2015)
- A petrol engine of Euro 4 standard or better (most new registrations after 1 January 2006)
- A hybrid, electric or LPG vehicles meet CAZ standards.
- For motorcycles/moped, the engine needs to be Euro 3 or better.



About the Clean Air Zone

A Clean Air Zone is an area where targeted action is taken to improve air quality, in particular by discouraging the most polluting vehicles from entering the zone. No vehicle is banned in the zone, but those which do not have clean enough engines will have to pay a daily charge if they travel within the area.

We need to reduce levels of NO2 in the air to a maximum average of $40\mu g/m3$ in the shortest possible time, and by 2020 at the latest. This means that we need to introduce a Clean Air Zone by 2019.

We think that, as a minimum, the Clean Air Zone needs to include all the roads within the Middleway Ring Road (A4540), **but not the Middleway itself**, the area shown in the map to the right.

The charge for driving in the Clean Air Zone needs to be enough to encourage people to change their travel behaviour or to replace their more polluting vehicles with cleaner ones, but no more. We think that a price in the range of \pounds 50-100 per day for buses, coaches and lorries and \pounds 6-12.50 per day for other vehicles will do this.

The Clean Air Zone is not the only thing we are doing to reduce the air pollution caused by road transport. We are already investing in public transport and routes for cycling, building charging points for electric vehicles and have a new policy on taxi emissions.

As well as the CAZ, we are looking into:


- Working with bus companies and Transport for West Midlands (TfWM) to improve vehicles and services and to encourage more bus travel, e.g. lower fares.
- Building more low and zero emission refuelling stations, including charging points for electric vehicles.
- Working with partners to develop approved schemes for upgrading the engines of taxis, buses and lorries.
- Making changes to roads, e.g. build more bus lanes, change junctions or roads to encourage people to take a different route.
- Reviewing charges for parking, e.g. charge for parking which is currently free.
- Reviewing traffic management e.g. how road space is used, sequencing of traffic lights, direction signs.
