Proposed Holyhead Traffic Management Scheme (North)

The residents of the area have raised concerns about the safety of the road in the area and have asked for the introduction of a one-way system to help alleviate their concerns and parking issues. The area does not meet the criteria for the provision of funding from the Local Safety Scheme Programme. A one-time-only fund has been provided to fund a scheme to address the residents' concerns.

It is therefore proposed to introduce a one-way system in the area that will affect the following roads: Aylesford Road, Mervyn Road, Newcombe Road, Rookery Road, and Uplands Road. In addition to support these and the existing measures already in place, it is proposed to install a 20mph speed limit on the roads.

The plan for the proposals are attached.

The proposed improvements mean that these roads are less likely to attract "rat runners" short-cutting through the estate between Rookery Road and Sandwell Road. The plans are also intended to result in parking for passing traffic to become a less attractive proposition, resulting in more road space to be liberated for local residents.

The reduced speed limits will also result in safer streets for pedestrians and cyclists to use, in accordance with Birmingham City Council's Transport Plan objectives.

The direction of the one-ways has been determined by the best and safest access onto and off Rookery Road and therefore options to amend the scheme are extremely limited.
