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Pre-Publication Proposal by the Interim Executive Board

Al-Furgan Primary School

Proposal to Change the category from Voluntary Aided to Voluntary Controlled.

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Introduction

Al-Furqan Primary School (AFPS) is an Islamic faith primary school in the Hall Green North ward of the Hall Green district of the City. The designated faith of the school is Muslim. The school admits up to 90 pupils per year in reception.

What changes are proposed?

The Interim Executive Board working in full collaboration with the Local Authority (LA) is proposing to carry out the following change to AFPS;

 Change the category of the school from Voluntary Aided (VA) to Voluntary Controlled (VC)

Why do we want to do this?

In November 2012, Ofsted judged the school to be "inadequate". An Interim Executive Board (IEB) has been in place at the school since April 2013 in place of the former Governing Board.

(An IEB is a small board appointed for a temporary period, by a Local Authority with the consent of the Secretary of State for Education, to replace the Governing Board and to lead a school that is judged to be in urgent need of improvement.)

During the interim period the IEB has made significant improvements to the school, including taking measures to: strengthen management and control of the Primary school budget; ensure appropriate use of school resources for the benefit of the Primary school; regulate access to the school and the use of school premises; introduce robust pupil safeguarding measures; increase transparency and accountability; improve staff wellbeing and address potential conflicts of interest.

Regular monitoring inspections have been carried out by OFSTED since November 2012, when the school received their judgment of "inadequate". Two subsequent full inspections have been carried out, one in November 2014, when the school was judged to "require improvement" and the second in June 2017, when the school was judged to be "good".

The IEB and the LA have been overseeing the strategic direction of the school. Various options have been examined including remaining VA, changing category to VC, and conversion to an Academy.

The IEB believes that a change of the category of the school to VC is the preferred option for AFPS as they continue their improvement journey.

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What is the difference for AFPS between being a Voluntary Aided (VA) and a Voluntary Controlled (VC) School?

When will these changes happen?

If the proposal is approved by the decision makers (following full consultation) it is intended that the proposal to change the category of Al-Furqan from Voluntary Aided to Voluntary Controlled will come into effect from 1st September 2022.

How will the proposal improve educational standards and increase parental choice? If the proposals are approved, a new Governing Board will be formed upon implementation of the change of category of the school to VC. The new Governing Board will build on the improvements made by the IEB and will provide stability for the school going forward.

Will there be any effect on other schools, academies and educational institutions within the area?

There will be no effect on other schools, academies and educational institutions in the area. It is a change to the category of the school. The admission number is not increasing, and the faith character of the school will remain unchanged.

What are the project costs for this proposal and how is it funded?

The only project costs for the proposed change to voluntary controlled category is the cost of the public notice in the Birmingham Post. The notice is posted in the public notice section of the paper on the first day of the statutory consultation. This is a statutory requirement under the school organisation process.

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How will this affect staff?

If the proposal to change the category of the school from VA to VC is approved, Birmingham City Council will become the employer of all the staff. The transfer of undertakings (protection of employment) process (TUPE) will be undertaken.

Any changes to existing terms and conditions resulting from the transfer will be in full consultation with the trade unions and teaching associations.

How will this affect pupils at the school?

The pupils should not notice any changes, should the proposal to change to VC be approved. The implementation of the permanent Governing Board will further help the school to build on the improvements that the IEB have implemented over the past 8 years.

Will there be any change to the admissions arrangements?

Yes, Birmingham City Council (as the Local Authority) will manage and coordinate the admissions at the school.

Birmingham City Council admission arrangements for Voluntary Controlled schools will apply.

Proposed Oversubscription Criteria for Al-Furqan Primary School as a Voluntary Controlled School.

If the proposal to change the category of AFPS to VC is approved, where applications for admissions exceed the number of places available, the following criteria (in descending order) will be applied;

Any child with an Education, Health and Care Plan is required to be admitted to the school that is named in the plan. This gives such children overall priority for admission to the named school. This is not an oversubscription criterion.

- 1. Children who are in the care of the Local Authority (looked after children) or were previously looked after or provided with accommodation by them (e.g. children with foster parents) (Section 22 of the Children Act 1989) and including previously looked after children from outside England.
- Children with siblings (who will still be attending Al-Furqan on the date the child who
 is applying is admitted) at Al-Furqan. The Local Authority 'Sibling' definition has
 been adopted.
- 3. For all other children of Islamic faith, priority will be given to those children whose parent/guardian is a practising Muslim. This will be confirmed by the parent/carer filling in the Local Authority supplementary information form and relevant sections completed by the Imam of their local Mosque.
- 4. Children who live closest to the school.

NB (i): If there is oversubscription within a category priority will be given to those children living closest to the school. The local authority's 'distance' definition has been adopted. Distances are calculated on the basis of a straight-line measurement between the applicant's home address and the main school gate on Formans Road. The Local Authority uses a computerised system, which measures all distances in metres. Ordnance Survey supplies the co-ordinates that are used to plot an applicant's home address and the address of the school.

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NB(ii)

- Looked after children of all faiths are given priority in the case of over subscription policy.
- Birmingham City Council (as the admissions authority) does not include criteria regarding children of staff as this would bring a level of inequity into the system and would potentially deprive a local child of a place, giving it instead to the child of a member of staff.

It is important to note that staff members' children who are already on roll at the school would not be affected, and their sibling priority would also remain in place for any siblings seeking places at the school (with a sibling still in attendance at the school when admission is sought).

Will there be a change to the Religious Education (RE) at the school?

No, if the proposal to change the category of the school to VC is approved, the school will continue to teach the agreed Birmingham LA syllabus for RE.

Will there be a change to the curriculum of the school?

No, the school will continue to teach the National Curriculum. In addition, the school teaches Islamic, Quranic and Arabic studies (IQA). Arabic is the Modern Foreign Language that is taught at the school. This is in addition to the National Curriculum and the current governing board are clear that this enhances the school.

What changes will be made to the Governing Board at the School

Prior to the IEB being established at the school, AFPS had a VA Governing Board. The majority of the members on a VA school's Governing Board were appointed by the Al Furqan Education Trust (AFET)

If the proposal to change the category of the school to VC is approved, the Governing Board will be made up as follows:

- at least two parent governors, elected by the parents
- the Headteacher, unless the Headteacher chooses not to be a governor
- one staff governor, elected by the staff
- one local authority governor, nominated by the local authority and appointed by the board
- at least two (but no more than one quarter of the total) foundation governors, appointed by the AFET.

The board can also appoint as many co-opted governors as they consider necessary. In relation to co-opted governors, there are restrictions on the proportion of governors who, in broad terms, are also staff at the school. When counted together, the Headteacher, staff governor and any co-opted governors who are also members of staff must not exceed a third of the total membership of the governing board.

Will this definitely happen?

There is government guidance and a statutory process the IEB must follow to make this type of change to a school. The IEB is consulting in two parts, as follows:

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Part 1: Informal Consultation ('pre-publication' period):

This current part is an informal consultation during which we want to hear your views on the proposal:

From Tuesday 25th January for four weeks until Monday 14th February 2022.

All comments received during the pre-publication period will be considered when deciding whether to proceed to part 2 (Formal Consultation 'representation period').

(Please note: Comments received during part 1 will be for the IEB to consider in collaboration with the Local Authority; and are not intended for the final decision maker*.)

Part 2: Formal Consultation ('representation period'):

The next part will be formal consultation (statutory: required by law). The final proposal document is published and allows four weeks for anyone to comment in writing (see the section below: "How can I make my views known"?).

From Thursday 10th March for four weeks until Thursday 7th April 2022

(*Only comments received during part 2 will be forwarded to the decision maker for their consideration.)

Decision process:

Following the end of part 2, the formal consultation ('representation period'), a report must be produced and passed to the decision maker to consider. The decision maker for this IEB proposal is the Local Authority (the Cabinet Member for Education, Skills and Culture.) Should the decision maker not reach a decision within two months of the end of the representation period, i.e. by **7th June 2022**, the proposal must be passed to the Office of the Schools Adjudicator for a final decision, for which there will be no right of appeal by the IEB or the LA.

It is only after the final decision that we would be able to say with certainty whether the school will change the category to VC with effect from 1st September 2022.

What will happen if this proposal is rejected?

If this proposal is rejected the IEB and LA will need to consider alternatives for the school. This would include the possibility of the conversion of AFPS to an Academy.

How can I make my views known during part 1: informal consultation?
