Introduction

Birmingham City Council (the Council), as the Local Authority for Birmingham is consulting on proposed changes to Uffculme School (the School). This document describes what is being proposed and why.

What changes are proposed?

The Council is proposing to carry out the following change to the School:

• Permanently increase the number of places the School can offer to pupils, from 204 to 266.

Why do we want to do this? Background:

The School is a community special school rated 'Good' by Ofsted. The School has a capacity of 204 pupils. The School currently offers support to pupils with Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD).

Evidence of Demand:

There is significant need for more school places in Birmingham for children with EHCPs, both in special schools in mainstream schools. In the last four years the Council has increased the total number of special school places available to pupils with EHCPs by 10%. There has been an increase in the number of pupils with EHCPs in Birmingham, by over 800 in the last two years. There is also an increase in requests for statutory assessments which may lead to EHCPs; these requests are currently averaging 150 each month. There is significant need for more school places in Birmingham for children with Speech, Language and Communication Needs.

When will these changes happen?

Following this consultation period, if the proposal is approved by the decision maker the changes will be implemented from **September 2022**.

Will there be any effect on other schools, academies and educational institutions within the area?

There should be no negative effects on other special or mainstream schools, as the school will offer specialist city wide provision for which there is a need. There is currently a high demand for ASD places and no indication that other schools offering this type of provision will be negatively affected. Any impact on other schools should be positive as this proposal creates places for pupils with ASD needs and so releases places at other schools to meet the needs of other pupils.



How will the proposal increase educational standards and parental choice?

The Council is keen to ensure that future places are provided in the areas that they are needed, helping children to attend a school nearer to home and as part of their local community. The proposed increase in pupil numbers at Uffculme School will increase the number of secondary places for pupils requiring ASD provision at a 'Good' school and provide greater choice for parents.

How will this affect pupils at the school?

Current pupils may notice the increase to the total number of pupils at the School. School places would continue to be commissioned by SENAR, in line with the SEND Code of Practice. The SEN designation for the school will not change. With the additional pupils, the school may decide to organise the school differently to ensure educational continuity but that would be the school's decision.

How will this affect staff?

Generally, staff will be unaffected and may experience more opportunities for professional development. If this proposal is approved, any impact on terms and conditions would be with full consultation with Trade Unions / Professional Associations.

Travel and Transport:

The impact on transport and travel will be minimal. The school will continue to update their travel plan, as and when required. The Local Education Authority transport arrangements for children with special needs will apply (Home to School Transport).

Will there be changes to the school building?

In order to accommodate the changes, a temporary classroom portacabin provision is being put in place adjacent to the playground on the Chamberlain Site. This will provide 3 classrooms, 2 breakout rooms and toilet facilities.

What are the project costs for this proposal and how is it funded?

The funding for the creation of the additional capacity will come from the Council's Special Provision capital budget. £938,000 has been identified for this project. The ongoing maintenance and running costs will be the responsibility of the school.

Will this definitely happen?

There is a statutory process we must follow to make these sorts of changes to schools. Following this statutory consultation, the proposal will be presented to the Council's Cabinet Member for Children, Young People and Families; they are the decision maker for this type of proposal.

It is only after a decision that we will be able to say with certainty whether or not the proposal will be implemented. The decision will be published on the consultation website below (BeHeard) and stakeholders will be notified.

What will happen if this proposal is rejected?

If the proposed increase in pupil places is not approved for implementation, the school will continue to operate at 204 pupil places. This will mean that a number of pupils will be unable to remain at or be offered places by the School in the future. Alternative and additional places would need to be



at other schools, which could have a negative impact on pupils out of school and on travel arrangements to other provision.

How do I comment on this proposal?
